


TOTAL FUNDS




October Revenues

FY 2016 FY 2017





- **Winter Showcases**



The performance opened with a fanfare and march, and concluded with John Philip Sousa’s iconic “The Stars and Stripes Forever,” followed by A Salute to the Armed Forces of the United States of America.

COMMUNITY DEV SEES NEW OPPORTUNITIES

Mayor Dennis Raines and Congressman Trey Gowdy, along with the community development team, participated in a community event at Evangel Church Mauldin. The event was designed to encourage the community to find ways to discuss and work toward reconciliation in today’s fractured world.

Economic development planner, John Gardner, retired in November but not before using his knowledge and resources to answer questions, solicit information and make Mauldin the right choice for Project Siberian. The team appreciates all of the work Gardner brought to the City and this project.

To gather demographic information on several development projects under consideration, the community development team met with the Appalachian Council on Governments (ACOG), a federal agency tasked with assisting communities with development, resources, and funding of projects. More than 32 meetings with property owners, development partners, and community leaders were held this month to discuss projects and development opportunities. There continue to be opportunities for annexation, but it is too early to determine if the passing of Sunday alcohol sales in Greenville County will challenge Mauldin’s ability to annex.


Youth Activities


Ray Hopkins Senior Center

Both Lt. Eric Lutz and Lt. Mike Taylors are certified instructors for the program. This training is open to any fire service personnel in the county.
